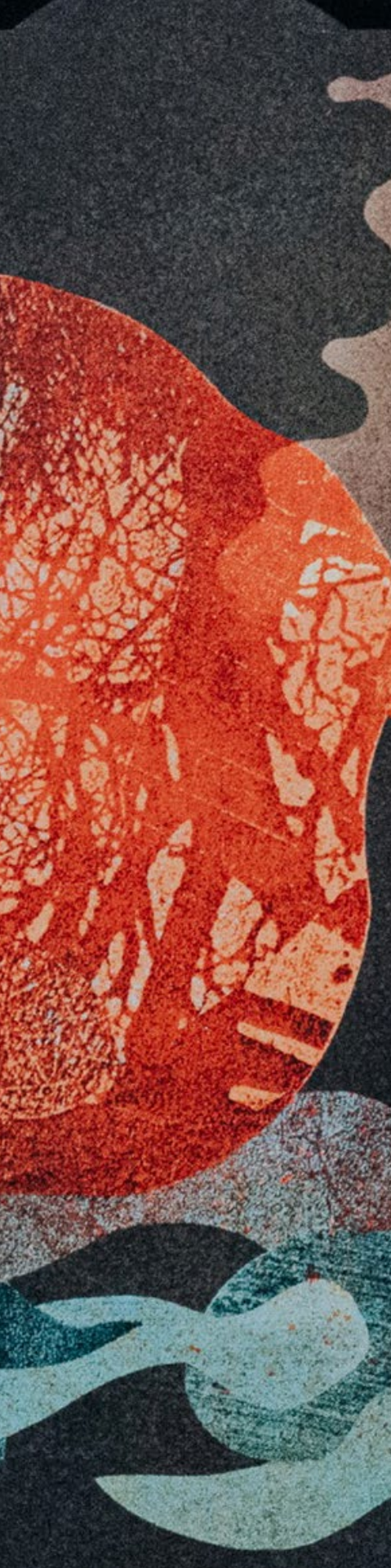

Alto is an independent and innovative publishing house founded in Quebec City in 2005. Very active on the local and international levels, Alto publishes unique and bold literary French fiction from Quebec and abroad.

Many of Alto's titles have won prizes over the years (seven Prix des libraires du Québec, eight Governor General's Literary Awards, five Prix France-Québec and two Prix littéraires des collégiens·ne·s) and have been translated into several languages. Simply put, we publish wonders.

Alto publishes only a few books a year as its mantra is "publish less, publish the best." We like everything that is surprising, often genre-bending, all this in a storytelling tradition that is driven by imagination. We like to be transported by a book. Through its new editorial laboratory, Alea, Alto is also exploring new innovative storytelling.

Alex McCann

Saint-Nicolas-des-Marins

Somewhere on the seacoast, the town of Saint-Nicolas-des-Marins spreads out across the map like a cancer. Here, everyone relies on sailors to keep the economy afloat and hearts aflutter. But when the cold sweeps in overnight, the sea freezes, trapping boats and sailors in the ice. Survival is threatened and tensions rise between the townspeople and Nico, the lighthouse keeper, who is a young man of few words whose late mother was a witch. His only companions are Prune, a mute orphan, and Elio Cabale, a butcher from a distant land.

With spring slow to come, the townspeople's hypocrisy and cruelty reach a fever pitch. Their children begin to disappear, and abandoned orphans, the illegitimate children of passing sailors, suddenly turn up. During an endless winter that pushes everyone to extremes, Nico plans an act of revenge that will spare no one.

In this stunning and powerfully poetic debut novel, Alex McCann borrows from storytelling codes that explore and challenge the logic of exclusion, the perils of conformism, and the tyranny of both tradition and false appearances.

Alex McCann holds a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in literary studies from Laval University and is currently a doctoral student in French-language literature at the University of Montreal. Since 2021, he teaches literature at Cégep de Trois-Rivières. His poetic suite *Dehors il fait un temps de lames rouillées* was longlisted for the 2022 Radio-Canada Poetry Prize. *Saint-Nicolas-des-Marins* is his first novel.

Les ressources naturelles

At Torrents, every ecological challenge has its answer. They transform skyscrapers into forests, they restore extinct species, they send algae to swallow oil-spills and robotic bees to pollinate flowers. Clémence Saint-Pierre, the communications director, believes every word of it, until the day an insoluble problem arises: the Gulf of St. Lawrence has been emptied of any life. Mired in the management of this crisis, Clémence works tirelessly, overseen by an army of drones, a tyrannical boss, and a woman with fox's eyes, while, in the basement of Torrents, an artificial jellyfish pirates her dreams. When she finally cracks, she decides to get to the source of the problem. On the shores of a seemingly dead Gulf, she discovers the scale that a life can take on, her own and others', when it transcends the individual—and she reconciles with ancient powers that bind her to water and mist in an inexplicable way.

In this second novel, Christian Vadnais deepens her exploration of ecofiction through an exuberant story that brings together professional psychosis, trans-humanism, and primordial legend. *Les ressources naturelles* is at once a merciless assault on “green” capitalism and a tribute to that which resists, and persists to live.

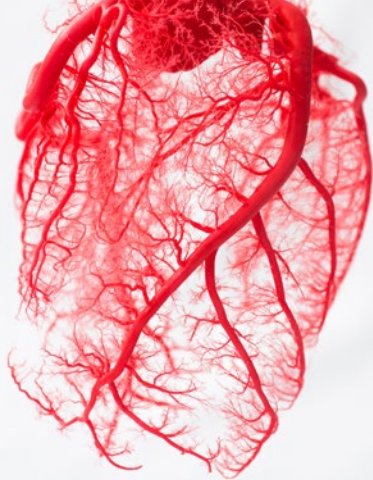

Le temps des sucres

Cultured, sensitive and resolutely urban, Guillaume Lacerte is dumbfounded to learn that the death of his estranged father has made him the beneficiary of a family sugar-bush deep in the Quebec countryside. For his paternal family, the funeral is an opportunity to introduce this young man to his ancestral home—where his progenitor mysteriously lost his life—as well as to a plethora of bizarre rituals and strange traditions centred around the veneration of maple syrup and a hyper-masculine way of life. Forest initiations, orgies of meat and unchecked brawls soon transform the refined bookseller into a raw, virile male. That is, until the secret of the Lacertes’ fabulous maple syrup comes to light, revealing to Guillaume just how far these men will go to dominate the nature that surrounds them.

Le temps des sucres is a folk-horror fable as troubling as it is hilarious, skewering both the cult of terroir and contemporary calls for a return to extreme masculinity.

Martine Desjardins was born in Mont-Royal, Quebec, where she still lives with her fox terrier Winnie. After studying languages, Russian and Italian, as well as comparative literature, she began freelancing for several magazines. Lavishly written, her books are often filled with a twisted humor and a touch of quirkiness. She is a Governor General Award finalist (*Maleficium*) and two time Jacques Brossard Prize winner (*Maleficium*, *The Green Chamber*).

She has been called Medusa for so long she has forgotten her real name. She walks with her head down, her face hidden behind the wildness of her hair, sparing people the sight of her Deformities – a pair of eyes so horrendous they repulse women and petrify men. She has never dared to look at herself in a mirror. Banished from her family's home, she is locked up at the Athenæum, an institute for misshapen girls that stands on the shores of a jellyfish-infested lake.

In this dark and provocative book, Martine Desjardins offers a radical tale of oppression, shame, and female force. With a contemporary, feminist twist on a Gothic universe, this novel sheds a crude and refined light on monstrosity.

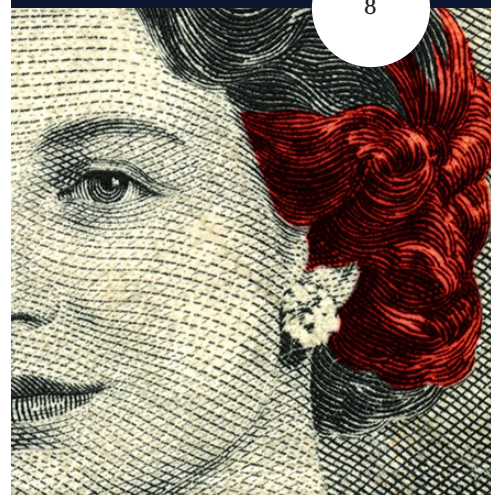

Between Egypt's Levantine community and Montreal's harsh winters, from the reign of Nasser to the dawn of a new century, Tarek flees, wanders, and reminisces. But does he realize that thousands of miles away, someone is compiling the chapters of his story and discovering the twists and turns of his life?

A poignant look at absence and reconciliation, *Ce que je sais de toi* paints a subtle, witty, and tender portrait of a family being torn apart and a society undergoing dramatic change. La part de l'océan

In August 1850, Herman Melville meets Nathaniel Hawthorne during an excursion to the Berkshire Mountains. This encounter will mark a turning-point in the life of the author who, at the time, is already deep at work on *Moby Dick*. Over the months to follow, he writes feverish letters to Hawthorne, like secret chapters of his epic book, born of his desire for a man whom he can never touch except through a novel. It's from these letters that Dominique Fortier stitches her story—and into which she mixes someone else.

This second storyline follows the paths of two contemporary writers who discover each other through writing and venture to share a real-life moment together, only to come apart again in fiction. By interweaving these two turbulent relationships, more than 170 years apart, Fortier succeeds—as she did previously with Emily Dickinson—to imbue vanished artists with dazzling new life, producing a novel that is both intimate and universal. In *La part de l'océan*, she explores the intricate nature of the links between writers and readers, the human forces that give birth to art, and the wish to incarnate, in a being or a book, the immensity and absolute beauty of the marine, terrestrial and celestial worlds.

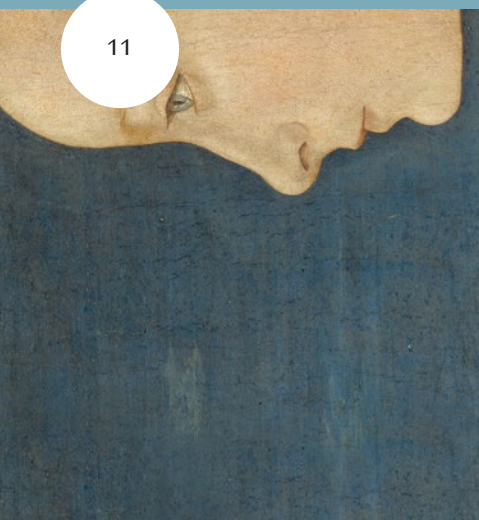

Quand viendra l'aube

During a stormy summer following her father's death, Dominique Fortier keeps a journal in which she explores the power of memories to outlive us and expand our reality. She records the mysteries, great and small, that surround us and mark our lives: a river flowing backward, birds that speak, a fog that lifts like a curtain rising, a half-broken watch, and enough questions to last a lifetime. *Quand viendra l'aube* summons the voices of François Villon, Emily Dickinson, and Rebecca Solnit to illuminate grief. Within these pages, the author of *Paper Houses* and *Pale Shadows* delivers a deeply personal and moving testimony tinged with shades of blue, the color of nostalgia, emptiness, and the sky at dawn, when shadows fade and ghosts reveal themselves for what they are: memories that refuse to die.

It's 1886 and Emily Dickinson has died. She has left our world, but a poetess is about to be born. Lait cru

The North American farm is not picturesque or peaceful. It is haunted by the dead, by ghost stories and family secrets, by stillborn chicks trapped inside their shell. Invisible cattle roam here, worn down by the endless grind of feeding the nation.

Among the shadows, a young boy walks between his shy elder brother and his wild younger brother, on the thin line between the fields and the woods. He eventually crosses the border, entering a strange land where eye floaters, tinnitus, and nightmares rule and where his fingerprints are lost. His body frozen, his mind ablaze, he finds himself in a psychiatric ward. But even from his hospital bed, he keeps wandering the farm grounds, looking for what is not yet lost.

Lait cru injects a healthy dose of Gothic into the old rural landscape. Appealing to both the senses and the heart, Steve Poutré's writing unearths skeletons from the fertile soil and demons from the mind. This startling first novel questions the servitude that binds humans and animals together in a twisted and tender way. A glass of raw milk to be drunk in one gulp.

Today, Steve lives and writes in Saint-Mathias-sur-Richelieu, where he has rediscovered his horizons and his roots.

Galumpf

A love is born in the belly of a church and dies at the end of every night. A little girl tries to tame a big dog while her neighbors keep a close watch. A man seduces a woman with help from a horse. A radio host is confronted with utter silence. Islanders struggle with their boredom and rage. A writer recalls her first words.

In her trademark incisive, poetic prose, Marie Hélène Poitras offers up short stories that travel back to the dark frenzy of Montreal at the turn of this century (much like the setting of Stéphane Larue's *The Dishwasher*) and then lead up to the present day. Along the way, she takes a few detours, even visiting the suburban Ottawa of her childhood, a place that permanently shaped her relationship to the world and language.

Whether set in the horse stables Poitras knows so well or on an imaginary island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the stories examine our relationships with one another uncompromisingly and with great curiosity and depth. They also probe the strange, essential thing that is empathy to better grasp its connection to the strange, essential thing that is writing. To wrap up the collection, she includes an essay that explores the foundations of her literary approach and links writing to horseback riding, in the same way Murakami links writing to running.

A powerfully stirring collection that lies at the intersection of desire, pain, compassion, and selfishness, the difficult terrain where humanity takes shape.

Under the blinding skies of Noirax, a long tradition of secrets lies dormant. The men of the Malmaison insist on this silence, feed their broods, and collect a string of women known as the desideratas.

Father is content since all's calm on his estate. He's locked the door to the House of Perfume to keep the truth from seeping out. After a failed romance, his son, Jeanty, is back home and exploring a new identity. Soon, Aliénor arrives to seek answers and rock the boat. The Crone also shows up, but isn't who she appears to be. The curtain rises.

La désirata pays tribute to stifled voices in graceful, lyrical prose punctuated by dark nursery rhymes. A luminous tale of rebirth, restoration, and revenge.

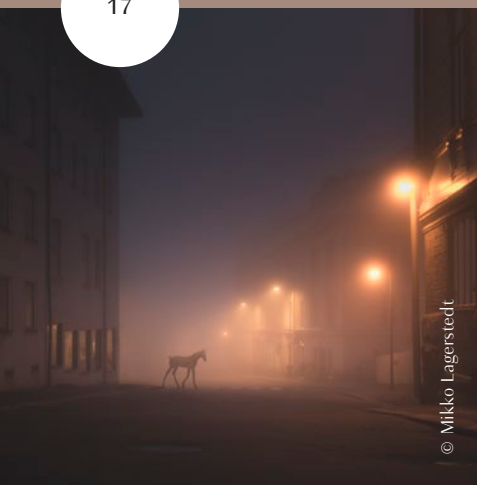

In this terse, prize-winning novel, Marie Hélène Poitras, with an imagination tutored by the Minotaur myth, offers a controversial tale about a thug who exults in his ferocious urges and is as incorrigible as a primal force. Torrès (the bull) enthusiastically and unapologetically seeks hectic transcendence through rape and recurring fits of epilepsy. Ariane (Ariadne), straying into his twisted, downtown Montreal labyrinth, suffers the consequences of his random sexual predation, though significantly, her refusal to be a terrorized and passive victim haunts him.

Ariane's deliverance from his maze, her conquest of persistent fears, is prolonged past her assailant's capture. Once more she must learn to live and love – in particular, men – to pick up and follow the thread of human trust, to feel sure again about her flat's dark places and her walk-in cupboard's contents. On the site of the Berlin Wall, in a reunified Germany that has survived its own and other regimes' violent perversions, she permits herself to be gently hoisted up and passed from palm-to-palm over a vast and joy-filled crowd.

A writer delves into the life of her aunt, who embodied creativity, adventure, beauty, and madness but died tragically in 1986. Denise Brosseau, whose married names and aliases included Denise Brossot, Denise Sorel, Denise Jodorowsky, and Denise Garcia Ponce, moved to Paris at age eighteen to study mime, then later to Mexico, where she turned to philosophy. Despite a life dedicated to art and ideas, she is little remembered today, while her husbands (the first a filmmaker, the second a painter), male friends, and lovers have left their mark on history.
